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THE STUDENTS OF SAGE DAY SCHOOL ARE FIGHTING THE STIGMA OF THE SHORT BUS By Cynthia Chazen

Every day as they enter the Rochelle Park Campus, students at Sage Day School pass under an arch inscribed "*Here you will do what others say you cannot*." But do they believe it ? After all, campus is situated right across from a public school, and the Sage students made clear they deeply feel, and struggle with, the stigma of attending a day school for students with mental illness. As principal Rob Friedland put it, "they know the shame of getting off the short bus." But students also said stigma is more of an issue for their parents and they find younger generations much more accepting of mental illness. And they want to talk about it.

But sometimes, the worst stigma people face is within themselves.

I met with Ms. Jelly's 12th grade class to discuss what stigma is and how it and mental illness should be defined, along with plans for creating a Stigma Free Zone for the school. The students impressed me as mature, well-informed and thoughtful, but still struggling to accept their illnesses and create positive self-definitions in spite of challenges. Some of the first remarks (only half-seriously thrown out) were "this is where the crazies go", and "we're psychopaths." Some kids couldn't look me in the eye at first. But as the conversation continued, personal truths emerged.

Wren said "Sage is kinda like family - we didn't have that [attending school] in-district." Francesca noted every student has an IEP (Individualized Education Program) so "if you need it, you can get help." Matt, certainly an advocate in the making, remarked "A lot of public high schools fight and don't want to send kids here because of the money. It's not healthy. It took me being hospitalized to get here." He was glad his mom pushed as hard as she did to have him sent to Sage. Griffith agreed and added that Sage had "in a weird way saved my life." He felt he was safe in a place where he could simply say, "I need help."

The administrators and board members at Sage RP (there are 4 Sage campuses across NJ) have real enthusiasm for what they are accomplishing. I wish I had space to include all their thoughts on social media and other mental health challenges to today's kids.

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Especially notable is the Sage program providing therapeutic services *inside individual NJ districts,* in addition to their bricks and mortar campuses. These programs meet district needs to support students on the cusp of being placed out of district and provide transition back for out of district students now thriving, along with supporting students with a mental health IEP at their school location in a way most districts can afford.

Sage students very much wanted our readers to know that they believe mental health must take precedence over funding and while they are ill, they are definitely *not crazy*. As we finished up plans for "A Green League" the atmosphere in the classroom had noticeably warmed. Just a simple chance to talk about stigma changed the way these kids were talking about themselves. The focus was off limitations and on to leadership. I couldn't help but hope the last thing NJ educators would want is for any students to be harsh on themselves while facing serious illness. Inviting a public mental health conversation at school is a first step towards personal progress for so many kids.

Students deserve our respect, and to be taught above all, they deserve their own.

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

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

RAMSEY SUPERINTENDENT TWEETS ON MENTAL HEALTH

Ramsey District School Superintendent Matthew J. Murphy tweets openly- and often about anxiety, coping skills, school shootings and other mental health topics. On February 28, 2018 he participated in the first countywide symposium on student mental health, which focused on understanding the growing anxiety epidemic among young people. The Ramsey school district website offers information on opioid addiction on the *middle school web pages*. Recently, the high school held a stigma free event, and participating students were openly praised for their participation by Murphy. This is powerful stuff in a world where politics leads many to never take a firm stand on tough issues, let alone one as complex as mental illness.

Murphy won 2015's New Jersey Administrator's Association Northern Regional Superintendent of the Year Award, among many other honors.

Certainly, this lead by example approach paves the way for the many important discussions surrounding mental illness that still need to take place within schools. In some districts, the argument over whether or not students can "handle" such mature topics hearkens back to the same debate over sex ed that took place 40 years ago. Helping people to have conversations about these issues is what the Stigma Free initiative is all about. After all, the world students are inheriting is shaped by problems that they will endeavor to understand and solve.

Mr. Murphy, your district's social and civic responsibility make Ramsey education a source of distinction and pride. Your leadership team and students certainly embody your shared mission: to achieve excellence, one student at a time. Well done!
